During Budget Estimates this year, the Minister stated she will explore "better predictive modelling" for the introduction of a permit system for forestry burn-offs (see Hansard, 25 June 2008 at <u>www.parliament.tas.gov.au</u>.

I note from the Minister's response of 14 July that this will be trialled with a view to developing a standard, and the Forest Practices Authority has initiated a review of the trial, while in the meantime epidemiological research will be carried out by the University of Tasmania.
