

Report recommends Victoria's 5pc fuel reduction target go as part of bushfire risk management change

The Inspector-General for Emergency Management has recommended dumping Victoria's 5 per cent fuel reduction target.

The state's annual target to burn 5 per cent of public land was a recommendation of the 2009 Bushfires Royal Commission.

Since its implementation there has been debate about its effectiveness to reduce the risk of bushfires in populated areas.

A report from the Inspector-General for Emergency Management has recommended replacing the hectare-based target with a risk reduction target.

It said the 5 per cent target did not encourage other ways to reduce fuel loads like slashing, mulching and grazing.

It said a risk-reduction approach would encourage better fire risk planning on public and private land and avoid the health impacts of air pollution from planned burns.
